# You now have a new Parish Priest! But what is a Priest? And what are my responsibilities?

Titles, there are so many in the Church of England, and it can all get rather confusing! The first thing to say is that 'Priest' isn't actually a title. Priest is one of the three orders of ministry in the Worldwide Church, the other orders of ministry are Deacons and Bishops. (And we may look at those in a later article)

We've recently had the annual round of ordinations, and I was present at the Cathedral for the ordination of priests this year. Part of the Ordination Service itself is very helpful in explaining what a priest is and what a priest does.

The Bishop at every Ordination of priests says;

Priests are called to be servants and shepherds among the people to whom they are sent. With their Bishop and fellow ministers, they are to proclaim the word of the Lord and to watch for the signs of God's new creation. They are to be messengers, watchmen and steward of the Lord; they are to teach and to admonish, to feed and provide for his family, to search for his children in the wilderness of this world's temptations, and to guide them through its confusions, that they may be saved through Christ for ever. Formed by the word, they are to call their hearers to repentance and to declare in Christ's name the absolution and forgiveness of their sins.

With all God's people, they are to tell the story of God's love. They are to baptize new disciples in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and to walk with them in the way of Christ, nurturing them in the faith.

They are to unfold the Scriptures, to preach the word in season and out of season, and to declare the mighty acts of God. They are to preside at the Lord's table and lead his people in worship, offering with them a spiritual sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. They are to bless the people in God's name. They are to resist evil, support the weak, defend the poor, and intercede for all in need. They are to minister to the sick and prepare the dying for their death. Guided by the Spirit, they are to discern and foster the gifts of all God's people, that the whole Church may be built up in unity and faith.

This is what all priests are called to; whether in full time paid ministry in a parish, in a self-supporting, or associate role, or working in chaplaincy or academia, all priests share these spiritual responsibilities. Also priests are priests for life, even if they have retired from full time active ministry, they never loose their priesthood once ordained. Ordination to the priesthood is permanent, and cannot be put on and off like a cloak, it can also never be repeated.

The church of England has it's own law, and because the Church of England is the State Church, our law is actually the law of the land.

Each parish has a priest who is an incumbent level priest, this is what I am.

#### These are the Legal Responsibilities of the Incumbent:

To provide that Morning and Evening Prayer are said daily in church

To celebrate the Holy Communion [or cause it to be celebrated in his or her absence] on Sundays and other days of special observance

To administer the sacraments and other rites of the Church

To be responsible for all worship & liturgy in their parish

To have ultimate responsibility for music, in co-operation with the organist, music group or choir master

To preach [or cause to be preached] at least one sermon every Sunday

To instruct parishioners in the Christian faith and to use such opportunities of teaching or visiting in the schools that are open to him or her

To prepare candidates for confirmation

To visit the parishioners, particularly those who are sick

To provide opportunities for parishioners to consult him or her to seek spiritual counsel and advice

To chair the PCC, the PCC standing committee, the APCM and the Vestry Meeting

To consult with the PCC

To co-operate with the churchwardens

So please do hold me to account! You should hear and see and notice

me doing all the above. But being a priest isn't simply about ticking off a list of jobs to do.

Being ordained a priest isn't like an honour conferred or akin to joining a club; holy orders are conferred by God for ministry to his people and so have a different authority and give a person a new identity.

The Church ordains by means of the Bishop calling down the Spirit, and for me it involves the giving of 'God's holy gifts for God's holy people' in the form of sacraments, not the policing of gateways to God. Priests certainly do not have a special access to God that is denied to others!

A priest is certainly not closer to God or deemed better or more effective. The Church has never believed that – But neither is everyone really the same. What on earth are 1 Corinthians 12 and Romans 12 all about? There's real difference in Paul's image of the body of Christ – a difference in what things *are*, not only in what they *do*.

Ordinations are not commissioning services. They involve the calling down of the Spirit upon the baptised Christian who has been called to this order by and through the Church for the blessing of God's people.

It's not easy, but it is rather humbling to accept the distinction of the orders to which God calls people for the blessing of his people and the ordering of his Church. The priesthood ministers the sacramental gifts of God (baptism and Eucharist) that are the foundation of all Christian ministries and callings.


Priests should set free the other ministries of the Church; they don't obliterate or exclude them. Along with the Word, the sacraments are foundational, hence we have priests to ensure and protect their administration.

After the ordinations this year, the Church receives a gift from God: some genuinely new ministers with permanent and lasting orders that do not depend on their own worthiness or qualifications or training, but on the grace of God. But it's a grace given not simply for the individual who is ordained, but for the wellbeing of all God's people.

If you feel called to the above, then the first thing to do is speak with me - I'd be delighted to journey with you!







#### A short story from the Bible

Jesus had spent the day teaching big crowds by Lake Galilee, and when evening came he told his disciples...
























The picture opposite isn't a children's article, it's a quick read of a well-known Bible story. What we used to call cartoon format is very attractive, child-

like maybe, but essentially quick to absorb. There have always been easy to absorb stories, the parables are exactly that in a spoken form! We now have the privilege of paper and screens.

Many years ago ordinary people didn't even have the privilege of reading,

but learned from pictures like this, it's Rembrandt's

"The Storm on the Sea of Galilee," painted when he was 29 in 1633. Sadly it was stolen in 1990. But he does such a lot more than telling the story pictorially. If you look closely, easier if you are seeing this on a screen (Ctrl and



scroll to enlarge) you will see a little

scared face which might look familiar. It's Rembrandt himself,

terrified, just as the disciples were.

Now read on, on the opposite page, where the story continues. The disciples became even more afraid when they realised Jesus had power over the storm.

What would your face show in Rembrandt's picture, and would you be even more terrified at the end of the whole story?



#### Scary steak and chips!!

I like steak and chips and it's fair to say it's a pretty standard British meal, in different forms and different prices. Harrods says "Kobe A5 fillet (249kcal) PER 100G 130 (Minimum order 200g)", the 130 refers to ££, so that's £260 before you add chips!! I have to say that alternative venues and prices are available.

But there's a serious point to this... our whole lives are changing due to climate change. In my Bible reading notes today (BRF Day by Day) it talks about the gods we make for ourselves that we then put high in our 'worshipping' lives. We all do it, I know I do, the strawberries I buy out of season that have been flown here, *another* new top to go with those nice trousers, a warmer house than I really need... I can hear my mother say "put a jumper on!" So lots of my "gods" involve embarrassingly unnecessary things. Chris Packham says that if everyone in the world had as much "stuff" as the average Briton we would need three planets the size of earth to accommodate it all. Now that's scary!

But back to steak and chips, a very ordinary occurrence. "Future climate change is likely to have a serious impact on two of the UK's agricultural staples, dairy farming and potato growing, according to a recent paper published by Met Office scientists."

"The authors found that future thermal heat stress in dairy cattle is likely to be greatest across England, and particularly in the South East around the London area, where in 30 – 50 years' time there may be up to 2 months more per year where cattle are stressed, compared to the present day. In the South West, the region that contains the most dairy cattle, there may be ten times more days per year on average when cattle are stressed. [We don't just get our food from Yorkshire even when we do try to buy local!]

Potatoes are vulnerable to a disease called late blight, which occurs in warm, humid weather. The conditions where blight occurs are likely to occur more often in the future across the UK, with the greatest increases in western regions. Most potatoes are grown in the east of the UK, where


potato blight occurs less often, and so there are likely to be smaller increases in these key regions for potato growing (20-30% increase in potato blight occurrence). However, in east Scotland a region which currently has a high concentration of potato farming, potato blight may occur around 70% more often." https://www.ukclimateresilience.org/news-events/increases-to-agricultural-hazards-over-the-next-50-years/

We can affect the future of our steak and chips because it's linked to our daily actions. Please think seriously about what you are doing to help the climate change to slow down. Freeze your own British strawberries, tell us all that that next top is natural or biodegradable fibres -it does look super!-, and yes Mum, I will put a jumper on.

And feel good when you do it, it's clever problem solving not something you should resent!



...so quite an event! Such a service is a wonderful mixture of Anglican stateliness, and local rejoicing, and the two extremes flow together, really making a whole and complete service.

It's purpose was to license and install. The licensing is a Declaration

of Assent to the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. These are the foundations of the Anglican church, and like house foundations are rarely seen but essential for shaping and support. Also in the Declaration of Assent is the Oath of Allegiance to the King, and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Lord Bishop of Sheffield.

Once this is completed the bishop signs the legal documents and



delivers them to Chris and Gill, and says "Receive the cure of souls, which is both yours and mine." Cure here means more than care, it is the linking between people and God.

Then Chris and Gill were literally put into their "stalls", the place where they usually sit. Chris as our vicar sits behind the lectern, which Google says is "The lectern where the Word is read and preached is the focal point for attention during the liturgy of the word at the eucharist." Gill was installed "not above or below her colleagues but to sit alongside those who serve in this place." Our new vicar then lead us in prayer with Gill leading the Lord's prayer.





Lots of local groups welcomed our new ministers, and they were

presented with a Bible, and a Paten and Chalice to hold bread and wine for communion.

We then all had the chance to renew our baptismal



calling together, and after the final blessing from the



Bishop and a rousing hymn the service ended.

But of course with good Christian hospitality we had tea and cake! And it was a wonderful chance to meet up with people, to congratulate members of the choir and their singing of the wonderful

#### What envelopes are you talking about?

The church needs to use its money as wisely as possible, not least of all because it's YOUR money that was generously given! Churches don't get government or any other money, but we use any donated money through giving or in bequests as carefully as possible.

Bank transfer -BACS- is the most economical way of giving, in that the bank charges are <u>least</u> for this. (Although in 2023 our PCC account bank account charges were still £224.27.) But it might not be possible or most useful for you.

You can give by card through the facility in church. Or by using the QR code on the back of this magazine.

Many people like to give in cash in envelopes, and you can have your own set of envelopes so you can keep ahead with giving weekly. The church thanks you for your faithfulness in this.

If you'd like to give a one-off cash/cheque donation, or as often as you like of course (!) please use a blue envelope from the big table.


