

Dear Friends

The use of Icons & images in prayer & sacred spaces.

Dear Friends, I count myself as a believer who stands strongly in the Reformed tradition. One of my great heroes of the faith is John Calvin, one of fathers of Reformed Theology. Within this tradition there has always been some debate about how to interpret the 2nd

At first glace we might think oh dear.... What about the numerous colourful images of Christ & the Saints in that surround us at Hatfield in the beautiful stained glass windows?....what about the four carved and gilded angels that surround the Holy Table at the east end of the Church? Should they be destroyed? Are we violating the 2nd commandment?

EXODUS 20:4-6

"You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth" (v. 4).

The truth is that the Church affirms the appropriateness of art for use in corporate praise.

If we turn to our Bibles we see that the law of Moses, Given by God Himself actually commands images to be constructed in the Holy Place (Ex 25:17–22).

Make two cherubim out of hammered gold at the ends of the cover. ¹⁹ Make one cherub on one end and the second cherub on the other; make the cherubim of one piece with the cover, at the two ends. ²⁰ The cherubim are to have their wings spread upward, overshadowing the cover with them. The cherubim are to face each other, looking toward the cover.

This tells us the second commandment addresses the worship of images rather than their existence. Secondly, among the first

believers filled with the Holy Spirit were the artists who built the tabernacle (Ex 31:1–11).

Then the LORD said to Moses, ² "See, I have chosen Bezalel son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah, ³ and I have filled him with the Spirit of God, with wisdom, with understanding, with knowledge and with all kinds of skills— ⁴ to make artistic designs for work in gold, silver and bronze, ⁵ to cut and set stones, to work in wood, and to engage in all kinds of crafts. ⁶ Moreover, I have appointed Oholiab son of Ahisamak, of the tribe of Dan, to help him. Also I have given ability to all the skilled workers to make everything I have commanded you: ⁷ the tent of meeting, the ark of the covenant law with the atonement cover on it, and all the other furnishings of the tent— ⁸ the table and its articles, the pure gold lampstand and all its accessories, the altar of incense, ⁹ the altar of burnt offering and all its utensils, the basin with its stand— ¹⁰ and also the woven garments, both the sacred garments for Aaron the priest and the garments for his sons when they serve as priests, ¹¹ and the anointing oil and fragrant incense for the Holy Place. They are to make them just as I commanded you."

Visual beauty is thus blessed by the Lord for use in worship. Artwork can help us sanctify the time and space of our gatherings. The priestly garments were made with gold, blue, purple, and scarlet dyes all costly colours in the ancient world. Including these materials conveyed a deep sense of God's worth. We continue to use robes & vestments in the Church of England today also, as a way to convey reverence & majesty in worship.

Scripture allows for images that depict the humanity of Jesus as well as pictures of redemptive events, people, saints and themes in our churches.

Yes, these can be idolatrously abused, if a person begins to literally bow down and worship for example Jesus in the stained glass window, believing the image itself to be God...I don't think I've ever come across such an attitude, and If I did, I would be quick to correct it! So you see the solution is not the disuse of images. Instead, the answer is the right use of beautiful art that bears witness to the loveliness of Christ. The Church has held several councils in her history to discern whether icons and sacred images could be used to aid worship and prayer. After a lot of debate and prayer over centuries, it was finally determined that if a person is looking to God through an icon, then that was a sacred and holy use of the image. If the worshipper began to worship the thing itself, then that was an unholy and dangerous usage. I don't think I need to say that statues & images hold no special powers, I think this is a given

today.

Anglicans, for the most part, have retained images and icons. Sometimes this is for personal use and sometimes in congregational worship.

Human beings use symbols, images, and icons, these can be religious or non-religious. We live in a world of texture, colour, visual stimulation and dimensional reality. We love beauty and we are calmed by it. We were made with eyes in a world of colour, image, and light. That's why God had Moses craft a bronze serpent as an icon of healing and why he carefully prescribed the way the tabernacle and temple should look. Of course, he warned them of abuses. But he never told them to abandon symbol as an aid to worship.

It is true that God was not to be pictured by Israel. But now Christ himself is an icon, the incarnate Son is the image of God. He was a human being that people could look upon, touch, and feel in order to see God. This changed everything because now God the Son could be seen visually. He showed us how to use our eyes to see God. So what does it look like if we Christians use icons and images properly in the worship of God?

Looking Through

Look through an icon. See it as a window to God. Not as a god itself, but as a window to God. How does this work?

I have an icon of the Risen Christ in the Vicarage. When I pray, I often begin by looking at the icon. The icon has beautifully captured His love. I am drawn to Jesus spiritually, and I become spiritually aware of his gaze looking back upon me. I knew myself to be someone whom he forgave. I feel my burdens becoming lighter.

Reflecting Back

You will notice in the Lady Chapel on the widow ledge there is a beautiful hand painted icon of the Mother and Child which was brought from St Edwins, Dunscroft. When I look at this icon, I'm always drawn to Jesus' hands holding on to his mother, she is also holding onto him. I know that I am being held by the Lord Jesus, and I totally hold on to him. This icon helps cultivate in me a sense of profound affection for God's love and for his care for me as a mother would care for a child. And then I sometimes sit in the empty church to pray for all of you. This building which is set apart for sacred use, is full of beautiful portrayals of scenes of the life of Christ and the heroes of the faith that totally surround our worship space in the stained glass windows. When I sit, I sense a calm & peace. I am reminded that I am spiritually

surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses. The beauty that fills that place gives me a taste of heaven, the carvings of the angels that surround the Holy Table, remind me that one day we will be taken up into the throne room, where we too like the angels will worship, adore and praise the Lamb upon the throne. My eyes see God in a fresh way, and my soul rejoices.

So yes, I use images & icons as an aid to prayer. Most Anglicans believe that visual images can aid our worship, but should never become the object of worship. That's why you'll see some iconography or other visual representations in an Anglican Church including our Church of St Lawrence.

I hope this has been a help to you. If you want to see and experience God in a new way, you are of course free at any time to look upon the many images in Church, and as you pray ask the Holy Spirit to open up a window for you to look through. It's one of those things which you are free to do if it helps & you are also free to say no thank you! But let us always be generous with each other and never judge those who are different to ourselves.

From puppet ministry, to baby loss, and sensory tray inspiration, we have brought back so many ideas (and bought some amazing new resources!) "A mother is never defined by the number of children you see, but by the love she holds in her heart."

At first glance you may see me as a mother of four beautiful children, but I have three more babies waiting for me in heaven. This is our story.

Our first two boys, Theo and Lazarus were textbook pregnancies, quick uncomplicated waterbirths. When we fell pregnant with our third child we were very excited, then at 9 weeks I started to bleed and a trip to the EPAU (Early pregnancy assessment unit) left us devastated as we learnt that our precious baby had died and that I was having a miscarriage. The possibility had never crossed my mind, the grief we felt was overwhelming. We felt our baby was a boy and named him Michael, we held a funeral service for him with our family and friends. We gained a new found understanding of the baby loss community. One thing that sticks with me is the outpouring of love and prayers from our friends and family, we truly felt held and uplifted in prayer.

Around a year later we fell pregnant with our fourth baby. Apprehensive yet excited, until again at 9 weeks I began to bleed. Another trip to EPAU led to those devastating words 'I'm so sorry, there is no heartbeat.' Another miscarriage. We felt this baby was also a boy and named him Samuel. We held a funeral for him and he is buried in the grounds of The College of the Resurrection where we lived at the time while Chris did his training to become a Priest.

A few months later in August 2020 we fell pregnant with our fifth baby. I felt incredibly anxious, and due to the pandemic all of my appointments were over the phone. I had an early bleed at 7 weeks and obviously

feared the worst, I had to go to EPAU alone, fully expecting to be told those words again but to my absolute surprise, there on the screen was a tiny healthy baby with a heartbeat!! I felt so relieved. Chris thankfully was able to be with me for my 12 and 20 week scans, where we saw our lovely baby wriggling around, this baby was the most wriggly one, a very active baby.

Then on 4th January 2021, we went into Lockdown 3, on the Wednesday at 25 weeks pregnant I woke up and didn't feel any movement from my baby, I did the usual cold drink etc and still nothing. So we loaded the boys into the car and Chris drove me to the hospital. Due to the restrictions I had to go in alone. I was seen quickly, the midwife found a heartbeat and sent me home. I just thought I was being over anxious due to our history and it was the first time I'd had an anterior placenta, I tried to keep reassuring myself, but by Friday morning I was sure something was wrong, I still felt no movement. Again we loaded the boys into the car and Chris drove me to the hospital. Again I had to go in alone, this time the midwife could not find the heartbeat and sent me straight for a scan, and that's where I was told the words 'I'm so sorry, there is no heartbeat, your baby has died' as I watched my still baby on the screen. The ground fell from below me and I hid my face not wanting any of this to be real. I got taken into the bereavement room where the midwife had to ring Chris and tell him our baby had died. He had to drive our boys back home to our neighbours before coming back to be with me.

I was told I would need to be induced and given tablets to begin the process and told to come back two days later. Our boys went to their Grandparents to stay and on Sunday 10th January we walked in to the hospital knowing we would have to leave without our baby. Our midwife Claire was so caring, she took time to get to know us and her words 'this birth is as special as any other' gave me the confidence to try for the birth I wanted. My body responded well to induction and Laura facilitated a beautiful water birth for us. It truly was such a beautiful birth, with candles and worship music our precious 1lb 9oz baby boy Gabriel was born into the water at 7.31pm. We held him, dressed him, cuddled him, took his hand and footprints and spent 24 precious hours with him. Then

somehow we left the hospital without him, instead clutching a memory box and went home where we told Theo and Lazarus about their little baby brother who went to heaven.

Baby loss can be very difficult to talk about, and simple questions can become complicated to answer like 'how many children do you have?'. But I am always happy to talk about all of my children, Lazarus especially talks about his baby brothers in heaven often, they will never be forgotten. When we talk about our children who have died, we honour their life, no matter how short.

I have dithered about writing this month mainly because I have been distracted by writing a eulogy for my brother's funeral, Don died unexpectedly on the 8th of September. He was my big brother, 18months older than me and a man of few words. Our phone calls went "how are you doing Don?" "Ok girl how are you?" "I am fine. What have you been up to?" "Not a lot our Ve, have you seen James (son) and Jacob (grandson)?" "Yes Jacob is coming on well and keeps me going, right our Ve I will give you to Eva (wife) for a chat" and that was that. Don was frequently in his shed "man cave", chair, television and until recently Jack his Jack Russel. What else could a man need? So you would have thought it would be easy to write about him, but it was not. I wrote about our childhood, the bit James wouldn't know, our escapades, adventures and Don's many visits to A&E. My mother was the original season ticket holder at the hospital because either Don was in A&E or I was in eye clinic, if you saw one of us you saw both. He was my champion, and I was the only time my mother was called to school for me was when I heard someone calling Don names and I hit the boy as hard as I could until a teacher broke the fight up. When I left home Don bought me a milk pan and a bible, the pan is long gone but the bible comforts me still. One of his grumbles was that my sister and I could retire at 60 but he had to carry on until he was 65 so I carried on working to 66 when I told him he was having a laugh if he thought I was working any longer. Unlike him I did not have a light job basically turning up making tea and keeping the young chaps in order, he laughed and told me that was the price I paid for education!

So now I must move on without him, I comfort myself knowing he is safe with our parents and was gone before he hit the floor.



Leave seedheads standing

Plants really are the gift that keeps on giving. After their flowers have died back, seed heads often form. You might be tempted to pick up your secateurs and trim these but try to resist.



Winter seed heads provide precious food for birds and other wildlife when pickings are thin. They also look fabulous covered in frost, adding interest to a border when not much is growing. Plants' dead stems even help protect your soil from frost damage. Feel free to collect some seeds to sow in

late summer and autumn but be sure to leave plenty for garden creatures to snack on.

When spring arrives, it's time to cut back winter seed heads and dead stems to allow new growth to burst through. Don't forget to <u>compost</u> any trimmings.

Here are a few of RSPB's recommendations for the best wildlifefriendly plants to grow for their winter seedheads:

- Teasel (Dipsacus fullonum)
- Echinacea purpurea)
- Opium poppy(Papaver somniferum)
- Sea holly (*Eryngium spp.*)
- Alliums (Allium spp.)
- Rudbeckia (Rudbeckia spp.)
- Globe thistle (*Echinops spp.*)


