



All Saints to Advent

We now enter the time between All Saints Day (celebrated on Sunday the 3rd November) and Advent. We often call this period 'Kingdom Season'. All Saints Sunday and All Souls, which we also celebrate on Sunday the 3rd November in the evening, declare our belonging and triumph in God. The Gospel announces that those who sleep in death will arise!



All Saints Day uses the famous dream given to John of the final day when there is a host in white robes worshipping God at the throne of the lamb: "who will wipe away every tear from their eyes".

Death cannot hold a believer. The resurrection is not a dream, but the reality of realities. Resurrection is more real than the death we will feel. What will it look like? The Bible tells us...a huge host "arrayed in white"— "all tribes and peoples and languages". They will have palm branches in hand and be crying in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne and to the Lamb!"

John the seer in the book of Revelation asks "Who are these, clothed in white robes, and from where have they come?" "They have washed their robes and made them white with the blood of the Lamb."

These are the saints who kept God's Word; they are the honoured of the Lord. How are they honoured? The Saints of God are radiant, and they behold God's glory!

They are washed clean as snow by hearing this promise: "I forgive you all your sins"—and filled by the Holy Spirit! All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, it is a time to be encouraged by the example of the well-known saints.

All Souls is an opportunity to remember our own saints in a more local and intimate key. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done.

Remembrance Sunday which we celebrate on the 10th November at 9:30am goes on to explore the theme of memory, as we confront issues of war and peace, loss and self-gift, memory and forgetting.

The annual cycle of the Church's year ends with the Feast of Christ the King on Sunday the 24th November. We will proclaim Christs universal sovereignty, before we begin the new Churches year in the season of Advent.

So be attentive! Join the host arrayed in white, listen to the word and you too will say, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!

Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen!"



What Happened to the Choir?

Towards the end of August, I announced my plan to recruit a church choir and declared it my intention to have a viable body of singers in place by the middle of September. I should have known that this objective was hopelessly optimistic.

That my ambition to form a choir wasn't realized doesn't mean that no-one at Hatfield Church is interested in singing. A successful Come and Sing session, to which everyone was invited, took place on October 8th and, at the time of writing this, another is planned for October 29th. Moreover, as long as such sessions prove to be viable, I plan to hold Come and Sing sessions on a more-or-less monthly basis.

But what of a church choir? And I mean an effective one consisting of members who are willing and able to attend rehearsals and are available to sing at services as required. (Readers may recall my stipulation that attendance of a minimum of two thirds of practices and services is essential.) Would it really matter if Hatfield Church never again had a choir? Should church choirs be consigned to history? Far fewer churches have choirs and organists now than when I began playing at services in the 60s. Many churches, indeed, have no regular live music at all. At least Hatfield Church still has an organ and an organist, albeit one who, at seventy-six, is noticeably a couple of decades beyond his 'best before date'.

In general, the state of music in parish churches is depressing to say the least and Hatfield Church is far better off than many, though I'm convinced that having a choir would be a significant asset. Accordingly, I am just as keen to recruit one as I was earlier this year. However, because I want the choir to get off to a secure and effective start, rehearsals will begin only when I'm confident that there are sufficient singers.

If you enjoy singing and have time to commit to attending the necessary practices and services, please add your name to the list at the back of church. Practices will take place on Tuesdays at 6.30 pm. The date of the first practice will be announced in due course.

Wendy's famous door wreaths!

She quite wonderfully helps us all to turn out a masterpiece, and has been doing for years. She provides absolutely everything, and will soon need to go and buy what we will need. So names on the list in church please, by the end of October, and these names will be binding to pay. £18 for a cemetery wreath and £20 for a door—the ribbons make the difference in price.

You MUST book a place as they are limited, sign the list in church and give money to Chrissy Grindle please, no money, no place.



Another list in church is for **INDIVIDUAL CHRISTMAS CAKES**, payment with order only to Chrissy Grindle please, by 24th November, £5.80 undecorated, £6.30 decorated with fruit and nuts, sorry about the price rise. Cakes will be in church to be collected on the morning of Sunday 8th December.

This year Prisons Week was from 13 to 19 October.

We may well be the parish with more prisoners in it than any other in country. There are a couple of prisons in the country with around 2000 prisoners each. In our parish there is Moorland with over 1000, Lindholme with around 900, and Hatfield and Hatfield Lakes, with 330. So we have probably around 2500 (all males) in our parish! That also means there are many people in our area who work in the prisons or who used to work there.

Hatfield Prison was a Borstal years ago (Borstals were a place of custody and training for 16-21year olds, but ceased to exist in 1982). You will recognise the sign "HMP and YOI Hatfield" when you drive along the Thorne Road. The sign means His Majesty's Prison and Young Offender Institution. There is a little farm shop and café with great cakes, called Thyme Served. It also sells some other products like towels and pillows and wood work, and there are refurbished garden tools. It's open every day 10am to 4pm.

Hatfield Prison is a category D prison, or Open Prison. The prisoners age from 20 into retirement age. It is over two sites, the main site, and the site where prisoners start, Hatfield Lakes, which is next to Lindholme. At the main site more than half the men have paid jobs in the community, at places like Next and GXO, building sites and a bakery. At Hatfield all the prisoners can go out for monthly town visits, or for longer periods away seeing their family.

The chaplain of HMP and YOI Hatfield, the Rev'd Christopher Hobbs, came to midweek communion on the 9th of October to mark Prison Sunday.

He said, We might be thinking how good that there are chaplains who are telling prisoners that they need to be saved, they really need it! But heaven is not a reward for a good life. Everyone needs to receive salvation like a little child. No one deserves eternal life. They need to be saved, and we do too. And no one is saved because they deserve it.

The motto this year is "Jesus looked at him and loved him". It is based on the gospel reading from Mark 10: 17-27.

In that reading there is a wealthy man who seems so devoted. He runs up to Jesus, gets down on his knees and says 'Good teacher what must I do to inherit eternal life?'

We might be thinking how good when wealthy people start coming to church.

But what matters is what is going on in our heart.

Jesus knew the man's heart. So Jesus quizzed him whether he had kept the commandments to do with our neighbour. Oh yes, he said, from his youth. The thing is, Jesus didn't ask him about the commandments to do with God. Sadly Jesus knew that this man's 'god' was actually his wealth. That was what comforted him, and what he trusted in.

So Jesus said to him he had to give it all away, and the man couldn't do that and went away sad.

Money often makes us feel safe without God.

We need to ask ourselves whether we would prefer some other 'god', like money, or power, or ourselves: or whether we are prepared to accept the gift of God in Jesus Christ.

It's just as hard for prisoners to do that as it is for us, but at least most of them know that they have done wrong. Some of us find it hard to admit we really have done wrong. Praise God for his mercy to us in Jesus Christ. He wants to give us eternal life. We can do nothing to earn it.

The Children's Society £62,911.40? November 9th box opening coffee morning

The Children's Society is supported by St Lawrence Church: by a Christingle service at Christmas, and by many people having boxes in their homes that hold the small change from their pockets. Don't belittle this, it's not just pennies. Last year this so-called "small change" raised £898, mainly in 1p, 2p and 5p pieces, I know, I counted them with help from Anne Render and Gill Atkinson, thank you both. In July 2018 £713 was paid into the bank and it weighed 7 stone, that's 44.4521 kilograms, so most of it IS in small change! Read on. To the end.

Someone asked me recently why I supported the Children's Society. I really do respect and trust other children's organisations such as the NSPCC. It's not a competition, if anything there need to be more groups helping children!

But I personally support the Children's Society because they are a Christian organisation. That means that they are interested in them living a life *with God* in this world, as well as their lives beyond this world, in God's glorious heaven. The society does not overtly "preach the Gospel" but shows God's love by example, and have Christian values. Another reason is that they are proactive to the very top level of decision-making. They research partly by asking children's opinions, twenty-three surveys have been conducted to date, including almost 48,000 children, in their annual Good Childhood Report. Using this data they then inform and lobby government.

What they say about themselves:

"We respond to government proposals, inform parliamentarians about our key concerns, and provide briefings suggesting solutions. Children in poverty including the impact of debt and financial exclusion on children and young people; children at risk including children who run away and those involved in or at risk of sexual exploitation; young refugees and migrants including trafficked and undocumented children; mental health and children and young people's wellbeing.

By focusing our efforts on the most marginalised or discriminated young people we strive to ensure that every child has a good childhood."

After seven years campaigning, the government promised to make school uniforms more affordable; 530,000 families have been given time to pay their debt after our Breathing Space campaign; £1.4 billion was secured through campaigning to help families in crisis. For over ten years we've been campaigning so children in poverty don't go hungry at school: in 2014, our campaign meant that all children in years one and two get free school meals, that's 1.3 million more children with a guaranteed meal each day. All of us are aware of the present financial pressures, and the helpless feeling of not being able to do anything to help anyone. An important way to help is to tell people about the Society, pass on this magazine for instance.

And of course please help financially too, in pennies would do nicely!

In the town and civil parish of Hatfield the population was 17,236 at the 2011 Census. (https://hatfield-tc.gov.uk/the-town/) If everyone put in 1p per year that would be £172.36. If they put that in a week — I can see you're ahead of me here - that would be £8,962.72. 1p each day... £62,911.40. WOW! And even if just the 190 paper copies of this November magazine, plus the 140 emailed ones raised 1p each day that would be £1204.50. Never belittle putting pennies in boxes, this is not little money! Why not pick up a collecting candle on the coffee morning on 9th November and see how many coins are in there by Christmas?

But the most important way to help the Children's Society is to talk to God about it, to pray for the Society and the children and young people it serves, to talk to other people about it too, and about why you choose to support it.





The magnitude of loss tempered victories roar No doubt such loss would again answer the call For lasting country and peace every danger ignore May such courage and devotion be inherited to us all


And those even denied a name stone white May God's holy light surround that unmarked place And for all fallen we pray in Heavens infinite light May you find eternal peace in His wonderful grace

The blood that our soldiers shed.


The heart of the poppy is black, Mummy?

For the men who never came back.


