Bishop of Norwich calls on UK Government to tax polluters to fund climate aid

The Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher, has joined with Catholic Bishop, John Arnold, to urge the UK Government to ensure large polluters contribute more towards climate finance at COP29. Their recent joint letter calls for higher taxes on fossil fuel companies, to help support countries most affected by the climate crisis.

As lead bishops on environmental issues for the Church of England and the Catholic Church in England and Wales, Bishops Graham and John emphasised that climate-vulnerable nations face an "impossible price" to protect and rebuild their communities after climate disasters. The letter presses ministers to seek new public funding from the wealthiest polluters, rather than redirecting existing aid budgets.

The bishops' call came ahead of the COP29 summit in Baku, Azerbaijan, where leaders negotiated new international climate finance targets. They argued that the cost should not fall on those who have contributed the least to climate change but are bearing its most devastating impacts.

Highlighting the urgency of grants over loans, the bishops noted that developing countries could otherwise face overwhelming debt. They also encouraged the Government to tax high-polluting activities by wealthy corporations and individuals, further pressing for sustainable and ethical funding to be prioritised in UK climate policy.

COP29 ran from 11-22 November 2024 and addressed how countries can bridge funding gaps for those on the frontline of the climate emergency.

Music Matters

Church Choir

I had hoped to have a choir in place by the end of September but this proved to be impractical. I'm still just as keen to recruit a choir, however, and now hope to have one in place by Easter. I hope the new pattern of services that begins in January will help in attracting more volunteers.

A handful of folk attired in cassocks and surplices does not in itself constitute a choir. Being a chorister involves far more than donning the garb and sitting in the Chancel. Accordingly, I'll not launch a choir until there is a realistic prospect of there being a regular turnout of at least a dozen singers, committed singers who know what they are about, in the choir stalls on Sunday mornings. And establishing a stable membership is not as simple as amassing a dozen names, or even twice that number, on a list. Not everyone who expresses an interest in singing in the choir will be able to attend every service and some have other important duties to perform at Sunday services.

Anyone wishing to be a member of the church choir should be willing and able to attend a **minimum of two-thirds of rehearsals and two-thirds of Sunday morning Eucharists**. Rehearsals, when they begin, will take place on Tuesday evenings at 6.30 pm. I shall begin compiling a new list in January. If you enjoy singing **and have the time to commit** to being a member of a choir at Hatfield Church, please add your name to the new list at the back of church.

Come and Sing

Three successful Come and Sing sessions have taken place to date and I hope that these will continue on a more-or-less monthly basis. The next Come and Sing session will take place in church on **Tuesday** **January 28th at 6.30 pm.** Everyone is welcome. No regular commitment is expected.





In case the numbers don't do it justice, here is one story from the last year that just shows the impact this work is having here in Hatfield:



Word Search - Gifts of the Wise Men

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? One Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote the much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'. Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king.

Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple.

Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial. If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people. The Wise Men were the very first Gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had!


