



Holy Week is coming up! 13th - 20th April.

The final days of the life & ministry of Jesus are made present for us. Entering into the mysteries of Holy Week can be a life changing experience. Please get these crucial dates into your diaries so that you can organise your life around these sacred days, which are not 'optional extras' but essential for every follower of Jesus.





Thinking of joining the PCC?

PCC members are the Charity Trustees of St Lawrence Church. They are elected to serve as the 'governing body' of the Church under the Leadership of the Incumbent.

PCC meetings are held 6 times per year (each alternate month) on Monday evenings in 'The Barn'. The meetings last between 7-9pm and follow a timed agenda.

What do our meetings look like?

Every meeting follows this same pattern. We begin with 20 minutes of socialising & catching up. The Vicar provides seasonal treats in the form of food & drink!

We then have 15 minutes of prayer. A different member of the PCC is asked to bring a passage of scripture to each meeting. They read it and offer a brief word on why they chose it. The Vicar then asks each member of the PCC to share something in the life of the Church which they are thankful to God for. We then discuss our current plans & thinking around the following 4 areas;

Mission & Evangelism (including our spiritual growth & outreach activities)

Governance (including; Safeguarding & the well being of our Clergy & staff team)

Buildings (including health & safety)

Finance (including our budget)

What is required of me?

Members of the PCC support the Incumbent & co-operate with them as well as the other trustees on the Churches work in the Parish.

Enthusiastic co-operation is the main task of the council. Working well

together in a positive & constructive manor is essential for PCC members. PCC members need to be people who demonstrate their commitment to the faith both by their example and their witness.

Legally the PCC is responsible for the finances of the Parish. The Churchwardens who are members of the PCC are responsible for the care & maintenance of the building & it's contents. The incumbent who leads & Chairs meetings of the PCC is legally responsible for worship, pastoral care & teaching the faith.

One of the main tasks of the PCC under the Leadership of the Incumbent is to think through what it means to be the Church in Hatfield - in other words our 'Mission'. PCC members need to be able to look and listen to the needs of both the congregation & wider community. PCC members need to be able to plan an annual budget thinking about the best use of our resources. They need to be able to communicate and promote our church & its activities. The PCC have a legal duty to ensure the church is safe, free from bullying behaviours and that the most vulnerable are protected.

All PCC members sign a 'Code of Conduct' which sets out in detail the standards of behaviour expected in meetings. This 'Code of Conduct' is available on request.

PCC members are asked to read documentation which is sent out to them prior to the meeting. Our communication between meetings is done via email, and so being able to write & respond to emails as well as download documents are essential skills for PCC members.

I would love as many people as possible to consider whether the Lord is calling you to stand for election to the PCC. If you are a passionate follower of Jesus who cares about the life and future of our Church, and you have a vision to see change and growth - then this role might be perfect for you! If you have any questions, then please do get in touch.

Important things to note before standing!

In accordance with the Church Representation Rules anyone who has served on the PCC for the last 6 years (or two consecutive terms) is not eligible to stand in the elections this year and must not stand for at least 2 years.

The PCC should represent the interests of all people in the church. For this reason the PCC members with their experiences and skills should represent **different age groups**, **gender**, **cultures and backgrounds**.

Safeguarding is fundamental to your role as a PCC members and before the first PCC meeting following the Annual Meeting (Monday19th May 2025) you will be required to undertake online safeguarding training, and send your certificates to both the Parish Safeguarding Officer (Andy Green) & myself.

Qualifications

Anyone nominated for election to the PCC must:

- Be on the electoral role
- Be aged 16 years or over.
- Have received Holy Communion at least three times during the past
 12 months
- Not be disqualified from being a charity trustee.
- Not be on the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups barred list or convicted of an offence relating to the Children and Young Persons Act 1933.

For this reason all PCC members must have a DBS check.

Diary of a Youth, Children's and Families Worker

The start of lent has been a busy but exciting time for me in my role and personally. Like many Christians, I try to observe lent as a time of preparation for Easter, drawing closer to God and reevaluating things. One way that I am particularly drawn to this year is an initiative called "40 acts" which encourages us to do one generous thing everyday in lent. I have tried to get the youth group involved this year, sharing each day's challenge with them and pushing myself to show them and our local community how generous our God is when we step out in faith.

Personally, I have been challenged to send encouraging messages, to check in on neighbours where I maybe wouldn't have before, to put

encouraging post it notes on lampposts up Cuckoo Lane for parents and children of our school to see, to share surplus cakes given to the toddler group with the staff at Travis school and to personally hand a gift to someone that God had placed on my heart. Our youth have been giving other students extra help in class, putting post it notes on their teacher's



desks to encourage them and sharing sweets with others too. Do search for "40 acts" to find out more and to be challenged to be even more generous in your Christian faith and see what God will do with it!

On top of this, I have delivered a lent themed assembly to the students at Ash Hill Academy which was really interesting – many pledged to give up annoying their brothers and sisters for lent, to reduce screentime or to stop eating meat. I have also taken part in the official Storyteller training for Open the Book, and our fledgling team looks about ready to get going with sharing bible stories in local primary schools. Please pray

for us as we start this and hopefully bring bible stories to life for children who maybe have never heard them before.

I am also really excited for what will be taking place over the next few weeks for our children, families and youth to celebrate Easter. Our vicar Chris and myself have been working with the Travis Worship Council to arrange an Easter journey experience in church during Holy Week for other schools and classes to come and visit. If you are free on Tuesday 15th April please do come and help us with this as there are 10 stations that will need supervising. Our youth will be going along to the Doncaster Youth Hub's "Life or Death Event" with creepy crawlies and an Easter message. We will also be hosting "Edible Easter" a craft event for families on 31t March. And there will be many schools visits including the Ash Hill Easter Escape Room which is becoming a favourite with the Year 7s every year.

So much to do and such an amazing message of hope and love to share with our children and families – please pray that the Easter message will sink in afresh this year, impacts lives and that I will have energy to share it with passion at all these events.

Currently our chairman John Chaplin is in hospital so we wish him all the best for a speedy recovery and to be back home soon.



The Hallamshire is a very large hospital but on a Saturday afternoon it was thankfully deserted so we got to our appointment with no problem and

everyone we met kind and helpful and a credit to the NHS.

Coming home some lovely gentlemen helped us in and out of the lifts and were amused by my comment that we were up from the country and not used to the city, judging by the size of their suitcases they were well acquainted with stations and travelling. The platform staff directed us to the carriage for wheelchair users, (who knew there was such a thing) and put the wheelchair on board for us. We travelled back with a young family, it is a joy to eavesdrop on young parents sharing the world with a child. No phone for this little one just plenty of counting and chatter about trains, cars and scenery, he is a lucky lad. The young dad came back to offer us help with the wheel chair, so kind.

I am sure we are going to become seasoned rail users in the future but for a first attempt it was a lovely experience and such a joy to meet such kindness from strangers, I thank God for the whole experience. Who was playing at Sheffield I have no idea but they sounded as if they were having fun in the sun. If only Wales had won at the rugby my day would have been perfect but you cannot have everything.

Out into the garden now to enjoy the sunshine and bring in my washing I truly am in the wrong century.

Chris has introduced a bi-monthly programme for meetings with any extra issues being dealt with via e-mail in between. Therefore this means an average of six meetings in the year and, in those, Revd Chris is extremely strict on time allocation. All are designated to finish at 9pm.

Still time for Lent...

If you feel you've done nothing, or little, for Lent, there is still time.

Easter Sunday isn't until 20th April, if you started on Tuesday 1st you could read a chapter of St Mark's Gospel every day, there are 16, and finish in time for the Lord's supper on 17th, when we will remember the Last Supper. Mark gives a concise account of Jesus' life, ministry, death and resurrection, emphasising Jesus' identity as the Messiah and Son of God.

You could learn the Lent collect... Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Now read it through putting *yourself* in place of *us*, "create and make in me a new and contrite heart, that I, lamenting my sin and acknowledging my wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness..."



Hot Cross Bun bread and butter pudding recipe

The Editor says as part of her Lent carefulness she doesn't eat any hot cross buns until Good Friday, although she *LOVES* them! So it's hardly likely any will survive for this recipe. But she is happy to act as taster for this recipe, in the interests of science only of course.



- 6 hot cross buns
- 50g of <u>butter</u>, soft enough to spread
- 3 eggs
- 60g of caster sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 250ml of milk
- 150ml of double cream
- 1: Preheat the oven to 170°C/gas mark 3. Butter an ovenproof dish
- 2: Slice the hot cross buns in halves and butter both sides of the bottom halves and then arrange in an oven proof dish
- 3: Whisk together the remaining ingredients and slowly pour half the mixture over the bottom halves, ensuring everything is covered
- 4: Butter the top halves of the buns, place on top of the bottom halves. Dot with a few bits of butter to make sure the tops don't get too dark. Then pour the rest of the mixture over the buns. Ideally leave to soak for about an hour but I made at lunchtime so just put in the oven after only five minutes soaking!
- 5: Bake for about 45 minutes or until puffy and rich dark brown With thanks to https://www.greatbritishchefs.com/recipes/hot-cross-bun-bread-butter-pudding-recipe and Mecca Ibrahim who wrote it.

Nigel Beeton writes: Hidden within the Passion story is a glorious illustration of Justification by Faith. The 'Penitent Thief' may or may not have been a thief, but up until his crucifixion he doesn't seem to have been a good guy, he is quoted as saying that he felt that his crucifixion was a 'just punishment' for his deeds. He must have done something pretty bad to have felt that way about one of the cruellest forms of execution ever devised by man's sick mind. But he recognised Jesus as his Lord and put his faith in Him, and Jesus responded by promising him paradise, despite the fact that this thief could do nothing in the way of good works in return!

I've lived a life of emptiness A common thief am I; Of no great use to man or beast And now I have to die.

They've nailed me to a wooden cross
They took my clothes as well:


