We're delighted to announce that our parish will be holding a Mission Week beginning on Sunday the 31<sup>st</sup> August (Hymns & Pimm's Day) and ending with a 'Guest Service' to which every person is expected to bring a friend along on Sunday the 7<sup>th</sup>.

Mission Week is a dedicated time of outreach, prayer, hospitality, and witness. This isn't simply a series of events or a project to tick off—it's a **spiritual invitation** to step together into the heart of God's calling for us.

### **Grounded in Scripture**

We are guided by the Great Commission: "Go and make disciples of all nations..." (Matthew 28:19). But we also hold onto the tenderness of Isaiah's words: "How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news..." (Isaiah 52:7). Mission is not about rushing people to faith—it's about meeting them where they are and offering grace, truth, and love.


#### What Next?

"Following the enjoyable Open Churches for Sheffield Diocese at our church the Quirky Churches event I went down to my cousin's in Buckinghamshire, and took the quiz which we did together.



In the village of Chalfont St Giles in Buckinghamshire there was an art festival and open church at their parish CoE Church.
This is what I saw within three days of the event!
Every day is a school day! "

Squints or hagioscopes are openings through a wall to show a view of the main altar. The view enabled the priest in a chantry chapel to synchronise his actions with those of the priest at the main altar, and enabled the persons in the chapels to see the elevation of the Host [the bread] at the high altar.

This church, Chalfont St Giles in Buckinghamshire, had two such chapels, at the east end of the north and south aisles, the chapels being provided by the donor to provide for the masses to be sung for his soul. Chantry chapels were suppressed by Acts of Parliament of 1545 (Henry VII) and 1547 (Edward VI).





Following the results of the Big Butterfly Count 2024, the Butterfly Conservation declared a butterfly emergency, so they need your help more than ever before.

You may have noticed that some species seem to be having a bumper year, so your data would be really useful to support any local 'surprises'. (My nasturtium leaves are skeletal!!)



The count is easy to do..... between **Friday 18th July** and **Sunday 10th August**, choose a place to spot butterflies and moths. Watch for 15 minutes and then go on the Big Butterfly Count website for details on how to submit your results.

If you're like me and only recognise a cabbage white, there are check-sheets at the back of church or you

can download them on bigbutterflycount/butterfly-conservation.org

The **Big** Butterfly Count is a nationwide citizen science survey aimed at helping us assess the health of our environment. It was launched in 2010 and has rapidly become the world's biggest survey of butterflies.

Butterfly declines are an early warning for other wildlife losses.

Butterflies are key biodiversity indicators for scientists as they react very

quickly to changes in their environment.

Therefore, if their numbers are falling, then nature is in trouble.

But remember, even though you are doing something important, you can still ...

### Dogs and heatstroke

An over-hot dog is a serious matter – if they can't cool down, they are in trouble. So when is a dog too hot?

Vets warn that in temperatures of 20-23C, you need to be careful not to exert them. At 24-27C you are well into the danger zone, and over 27C is life-threatening for them.

Dogs who suffer early on are those with short noses, flat faces, or heavy coats. Small dogs suffer worse than large ones, as do all older and overweight dogs.

Dogs cannot sweat through their coats, but only through the pads on their feet. They cool themselves by panting, which releases heat through the evaporation of their saliva from their extended tongues.

Here are the signs of heatstroke. If you see these in your dog, take action FAST, and call a vet: Excessive panting, drooling, increased heart rate, very red or very pale gums and tongue, vomiting, diarrhoea, bloodshot eyes, increasing lethargy.

Get your dog out of the sun and into the shade. Stand it in a tub of cool water, and splash its tummy, between its legs and under the tail – not just on the back. But cool it gradually - don't use very cold water, to avoid causing shock. Let your dog lie on wet towels.

As for Walkies, in hot weather, go before 8am and after 7pm. Hot pavements and roads can seriously burn a dog's pads. Try holding your palm on the pavement for 15 seconds - if it is too hot for you it is too hot for your dog.

NEVER leave your dog in a parked car. A car left in the sun can heat up to 47C within an hour. And your dog enters the life-threatening zone at 27C.


