

BLAW Baby loss awareness week 9th – 15th October 2025

'Together we care'

As the wife of a vicar, I am often in the role of supporting others in their joys and sorrows. But baby loss awareness week is a reminder that I too have walked the painful road of losing babies, and the care we receive in those moments, makes all the difference.

Chris and I are blessed with four living children, but in between them, we have known the heartbreak of losing three babies.

In our journey, we have experienced both the absence and the presence of good bereavement care. At our first miscarriage we were given the news and then left in a corridor before being sent for blood tests in a busy waiting room, I remember sitting there watching the world go by whilst mine felt like it had just ended. We felt utterly alone, as though our grief was invisible to those around us. We searched out the hospital chapel and chaplain who sat with us, and afterwards at home we felt so upheld in prayer from our family and friends.

At other times however the experience was very different. At our second miscarriage we were taken straight to a bereavement room, given tea, time and space to process our grief, and treated with gentleness and respect.

When our son Gabriel was stillborn, every member of staff showed genuine care, not only for us, but for him too. We were encouraged to spend time with him, to hold him, to make memories. Their compassion gave us dignity and space to grieve, and left us knowing his short life was valued.

What I've learned is that care matters deeply. The difference between feeling abandoned and feeling supported can rest on the smallest gestures, a quiet room, a kind word, a cup of tea, a willingness to listen. And beyond hospital walls, we have also known the care of the church

and our wider community, family and friends surrounding us with prayer, remembering our babies by name, and reassuring us that we were not alone.

Baby loss never fully leaves a family. Even everyday questions like 'how many children do you have?' can open up tender places in the heart. But when we know that others care, that our grief is shared, that our babies are remembered, and that our pain is not dismissed, we are given strength to carry on.

This is why Together we care is such an important theme. As Churches, as friends, as communities, we can help make sure no family feels they must grieve in silence. We can listen without judgement, speak the names of our precious babies, pray for those whose hearts are broken, and encourage excellent bereavement care in our hospitals.

Gentle ways we can show we care together during BLAW There are many small, thoughtful things we can do to show love and care for families who grieve. You might like to:

Light a candle on 15th October at 7pm for the wave of light, to remember babies gone too soon.

Remember milestones, birthdays and anniversaries, they can be gently acknowledged and this can mean a lot.

Hold grieving families in prayer, asking God's comfort and peace for them.

Send a kind message or card to someone you know who has experienced loss.

Place a flower somewhere special as a quiet act of remembrance.

Offer to sit beside someone in Church who may find this week especially hard.

Even the smallest acts of kindness can shine God's love into someone's deepest sorrow.

On October 1st we remember Theresa of Lisieux - making the most of life

Theresa of Lisieux (1873-97) should be the patron saint of teenage girls and young women who want to make the most of their lives, despite being constrained by family and school or work.

Theresa grew up in a strict, devout Roman Catholic middle-class family in France, one of four sisters. Her father was a watch-maker. Like her sisters, she entered a Carmelite convent at 15, and stayed there. She was never able to go anywhere, do anything extraordinary, or hold any responsibility. She died at the age of 24 of tuberculosis. Yet this quiet young Carmelite nun became so nationally popular that she was declared patroness of France 50 years after her death. Not bad for someone who didn't get out much!

So how did Theresa do it? By not intending to do it at all. Theresa never set out to become famous: instead, she quietly determined in her spirit to seek God, and, having found Him, to honour Him in her life, to live as closely as she could to the teaching in the gospels.

The result was a life so spiritually radiant that her convent asked her to write a short spiritual autobiography of her pilgrimage. Theresa obliged with 'L'Histoire d'une Ame', which soon became so popular that it was translated into most European languages and several Asiatic ones. Theresa also prayed for people who were ill, and there are many reports of miraculous healings that took place in answer. After Theresa died in 1897, her book just went on selling. People found the artless sweet simplicity of her observations on her pilgrimage as a Christian compelling. Theresa reminded people of what Christianity was really all about: simple but utter devotion to Christ, not endless outward observance of religion. Theresa helped many in the Roman Catholic Church in France to remember the first principles of

their faith.

Diary of a Youth, Children's and Families Worker

What a September it has been this year – I have certainly felt God moving as we start the new term and I hope you all did too. Coming back from my annual leave straight into Mission Week was amazing. I was able to spend three mornings on

the church door talking to children and parents, offering free cups of tea and prayer where needed. We saw a vast array of people, from the mum dropping their reception class child off for the first time in tears. needing a hug as she went on with the rest of her day. to the slightly nervous children not sure what to expect of a new





teacher, those who didn't want to see the back of the holidays, and the parents very much in need of adult company and a chat after 6 weeks with the kids! Many conversations were had, and we invited lots to church and the Banquet event. It was such a joy to see some of those faces at Café Church on the Sunday afternoon too as we continue to pray that God will stir in the hearts of people and draw them back to church.

I am also one assembly away from completing my Backpack Blessing Roadshow around the schools in Hatfield, and I always receive such a warm welcome. This year I am challenging the pupils to be a light

and shine before others this school year – so that they will bring praise to God, their school, their class and their families. Jesus is the ultimate light and example for us, but we all have our own light that we can shine out wherever we go. The God moment in this year's roadshow was at Sheep Dip Lane Primary Academy, where the head said excitedly that they are learning "This Little Light of Mine" in their singing assembly on Friday, and that they want to sing it for us when we go in for Open the Book.

God certainly seems to be working in the background of all the groups and

activities I am involved in, and here are some other things I am thankful for this month:

Abbie and Joy taking over the running of Little Lions Toddler Group on Thursdays. They have such a passion for our little ones, I know they will do an amazing job! Rev'd Gill and Sarah support them in this too, and I'll be popping down whenever I can, but this frees up my Thursdays to run the Youth Alpha Course at Ash Hill Academy from October.

So many Year 6's joining our Hatfield Heroes Youth Group this September! We had our largest number in church on Sunday, with 17 coming down, and there are now 27 on our register if everyone turns up!!! I remember going to the PCC a couple of years ago to speak about doubling the numbers in our Youth by 2030, but God seems to be in much more of a hurry than us. The amazing thing is that many of them do come to Café Church too, so please pray for their continued spiritual growth.

A team to work alongside. I am forever thankful for the volunteers who support me and the staff team at Hatfield St Lawrence. To see the success of Lawrence's Place this month has me excitedly planning some "family focussed" ideas to go alongside the community café such as "Pokemon Card Swap Tables", "Christmas Present wrapping stations" and the opening of our Uniform Bank at the same time.

My plea to you this month is to ask for your support for the upcoming Youth Alpha Course. This is an exciting opportunity, but one that needs the full support of our whole church family. Please could you consider helping in one of three ways:

Praying! Pray for all 30 places to be filled and for more young people to be interested in attending than we have space for. Pray for God to speak to these young people and bring transformation and salvation.

Volunteering. It would be great to have a second helper to come along and chat

with the young people each week. It will be 2-3:30pm on Thursday afternoons

Donating. The cost of resources, snacks for each week and to gift each attendee a bible at the end will be approximately £300 (or £10 per young person). Sanctuary Lamp Sponsorship

If you have ever paused in the Lady Chapel, you will have noticed the small lamp that burns gently behind the altar. This Sanctuary Lamp is a sign of Christ's presence in our church, a reminder that He is always with us, a light shining in the darkness.

As well as being a symbol of Christ's presence, the lamp may also burn in memory of a loved one who has died. Many people find it comforting to mark a special date, such as a birthday or the anniversary of a passing, by dedicating the lamp to someone they hold dear.

The lamp may also be sponsored for other occasions and reasons for thanksgiving: to celebrate a wedding anniversary, to give thanks for answered prayer, for recovery from illness or surgery, to welcome the birth of a child or grandchild, or simply to express gratitude for the love and support of our church family. Whatever the reason, the light of the lamp becomes a visible sign of prayer, hope, and thanksgiving.



Run by volunteers on a not-for-profit basis, the café will offer affordable drinks and simple snacks, so that everyone — individuals, families, carers, and those on a tight budget — can join in without worry. Our focus isn't just on refreshments, but on hospitality, care, and community.

We will be inviting local charities, advice services, and wellbeing groups to share information or simply be present, making the café a bridge to other helpful resources in the area.

Whether you're new to the neighbourhood, a long-time resident, a parent needing a breather, or someone simply looking for good company, you're warmly invited. Come and be part of something hopeful and grounded in community. There's always a seat at the table — and always a welcome waiting.

The Children's Society coffee morning and box opening

The Children's Society is supported by St Lawrence Church, by a Christingle service at Christmas, and by 40+ people having boxes in their homes that hold the small change from their pockets. Don't belittle this, read on. To the end. Last year this so-called "small change" raised nearly £1,000, mainly in 1p, 2p and 5p pieces, I know I counted them and carried them to the bank! Keep reading.



Someone asked me recently why I supported The Children's Society. I really do respect and trust other children's organisations such as the NSPCC. It's not a competition, if anything there need to be more groups helping children! But I personally support the Children's Society because they are a Christian organisation. That means that they are interested in children's lives beyond this world, as well as their life on earth. They do not overtly "preach the Gospel" but show God's love by example, and have Christian values. Another reason is that they are proactive to the very top level of decision-making. They research partly by asking thousands of children's opinions in their famous Good Childhood Report, and taking that information to Parliament to change the lives of children in the UK.

"For our 2012 Fair and Square campaign, we called on the Government to extend free school meals to all children living in poverty. In response, they announced that all children in reception, years one and two would be entitled to a free school meal." Since then they've kept pushing, this time for free school meals for all families on Universal Credit, watch this space!

Theirs was the boost, with other information, that made the Government limit the price of new uniforms, and that also lead to uniform banks, such as we have at St Lawrence. Without the Children's Society the price of school uniforms would be even higher today.

What they say about themselves:

"We respond to government proposals, inform parliamentarians about our key concerns, and provide briefings suggesting solutions. We have championed disadvantaged children throughout our 140-year history, and today our policy work is focused on these groups of disadvantaged children:

- children in poverty including the impact of debt and financial exclusion on children and young people
- children at risk including children who run away and those involved in or at risk

of sexual exploitation

- young refugees and migrants including trafficked and undocumented children
- mental health and children and young people's wellbeing.

"We work with decision makers at both the national and local level to tell what children and young people want and what they think about their lives.

"By focusing our efforts on the most marginalised or discriminated young people we strive to ensure that every child has a good childhood."

Everyone is aware of the financial pressures of life in 2025, and the helpless feelings of not being able to do anything to help anyone. An important way to

help is to tell people about the Society, pass on this magazine for instance. Of course help—financially too, yes the 1p, 2p, 5p all count towards their costs!

From the 2001 census there were 5,630 households in the ward of Hatfield, a population of 15,048, it's now 17,584. If every household put 1p in a box every week there would be £2927.60 by the end of the year. Do the maths, yes it's £7824.96 if every person put in 1p. And 1p a day from every person... £54925.20.



Never belittle putting pennies in boxes, this is not little money!


