

The Holy Calling of Motherhood

For as long as I can remember, I've wanted to be a mother. It's been woven into me from the very beginning, like a quiet, steady heartbeat. This week, I'm on Bude beach with my own children, watching them tear across the same stretch of sand where I played as a little girl. I remember standing here years ago, dreaming of the day I might bring my own family. And now here they are, noisy, sandy, full of life, living out the dream God planted in my heart all those years ago.

Some days, the noise of four children feels like a song in our home—sometimes beautifully in tune, other times... not so much. As a vicar's wife, people often imagine my days are filled with tea and flowers and peaceful moments of prayer. But if I'm honest, motherhood is the altar where my faith is most often stretched, tested, and refined.

I lost my own mum when I was just fifteen. Her absence has been both a deep ache and a quiet teacher. There are so many times I wish I could ask her how she made it through the sleepless nights, or how she found the words to calm an anxious child. But in that longing, I've learned to lean on the Lord as my perfect Parent, the One who never leaves, never tires, and never runs out of love.

We've also known the grief of losing a child. Our third was stillborn, and there simply aren't words for the pain of holding your baby only to let them go. Yet even there, in the valley of shadows, Christ met us. He wept with us. He carried us. And He reminded me that being a mother isn't just about the children I hold in my arms, but also the ones I carry in my heart until we meet again in heaven.

I often think of how Jesus welcomed children, how He blessed them right in the middle of the noise and chaos, how He met mothers in the very thick of life. He still does. That's why I've come to see that my motherhood, messy, noisy, and sometimes tear-stained, is holy ground.

I'm learning that to mother well isn't to be perfect. It's to be present. It's to trust that the same God who walked with me through loss is the One shaping my children now, through my love, my prayers, and even my flaws. And in that, I've realised: motherhood isn't about having all the answers. It's about walking each day with the One who is the Answer.

Ever since I can remember, I've known this was my calling. Just as Chris is called to be a priest, I am called to be a mother.



I write this at the end of a busy summer, in the last few days before I go off on my annual leave. I am currently meditating on the word "Selah" used many times in the Psalms. It is a musical term, used to describe a pause, rest, chance to reflect before carrying on, and I believe that to be a great description of what August is in my calendar. So please forgive me for not having lots of stories and activities to share for this month! However, this academic year has seen many things to be thankful for, some things that need to be changed and improved, and the space at in the summer holidays (after the madness of Summer Club!) allows chance to pause, rest and reflect before starting all over again in September!!

Here are a few things to thank God for this year:

- A safe and fun summer club (no accident book entries!) over 50 children in church each day and their families, hearing about creation and that God wants to be their friend. Many took friendship bracelets on the last day to signify this.
- Families coming to Café Church off the back of summer club –
 we had at least three new families come to try Café Church out at the
 end of summer club, so please pray that they want to come back and
 become part of our church family
- **Growth in our youth group** we are looking at having over 20 young people in September which has grown from nothing after Covid.
- Young leaders stepping up they really were a credit to the church at summer club, helping with crafts, running activities and games, on stage and taking photos.
- **Volunteer team growing** this year we have had new members of the summer club team which is always encouraging
- Open the Book Team launching this will be a real asset and allow us regular contact with local primary schools

As we start the new Academic Year, please pray for and consider if you can get involved in the following:

- Cuppa in the Churchyard an outreach event of handing out free cups of tea and coffee to parents the first week back in September. We'll be there Wednesday, Thursday and Friday so come along and help if you can.
- Alpha Course in Ash Hill Academy from October to December we

have been given permission to run a after school Alpha course at the Secondary School. This is an amazing testament to what the Holy Spirit is doing in our schools and the next generation. Please pray for young people to meet with Jesus and be transformed by taking part.

• **Mentoring and Relationships** – I really want our young people to feel part of the church and to grow in their faith journey. As part of my reflecting, I believe mentoring needs to become a bigger part of our youth work so we can invest more in them individually. If you would be interested in meeting one-to-one with a young person (after safeguarding training and checks done) then please do contact me. Many of you have much to offer to this next generation!

Trust Carol to so something like this, amazing woman! All went well. You can sponsor until September 27th.




VJ Day, 15th September 1945, 80 years on

What a surprise!

Recently I went to the Savoy cinema, and timing when travelling by bus being awkward for us we decided to take a picnic lunch and eat it in the lower floor of the Danum Gallery, Library and Museum beforehand. There are 3 or 4 benches and tables to study or eat, next to two enormous train engines —stationary of course! And a super café upstairs! As we ate quickly giving us an extra 10 minutes we decided to look at the outside area. What a surprise it was, it's a small garden backing onto Chequer Road, opposite the former auditory and mammogram centre, and is a



garden with most creative art works!

I loved the pink tree, what an imaginative way to distract the eye from a plain fence, and combines the work of many creators— please let the editor know if you count the flowers and buds!

The hexagons shown in the Save the Bees wall are a highly efficient shape. Bees instinctively create hexagonal cells because this shape stores the maximum honey with the least amount of wax.

Hexagons occur in honeycombs, in the compound eyes of insects, which maximizes light capture, enhancing vision crucial for survival,

and in soap bubbles and foams: surface tension causes soap bubbles to arrange in hexagonal patterns, minimizing surface area and the energy needed to hold their shape. And they occur in snowflakes, we all know they're six-sided: as water freezes, its molecules align into a hexagonal lattice to maximize hydrogen bonding, leading to the symmetric and energy-efficient structure of snowflakes. This shape is thought to occur by natural forces striving to reduce energy consumption. So millions of years ago bees were SO far ahead of us in using our shared planet wisely, possibly before homo sapiens existed!

Let's copy the bees!




