Mission in Motion: Embracing Change at St Lawrence

From the Vicar

We're moving toward sharing jobs as part of a team wherever possible. It's better for sustainability, better for creativity, and better for discipleship. It's not healthy to say "that's their job, they always do it!"

A Church That Moves

St Lawrence is not a museum it's a mission outpost.

That means we'll always be adapting, always listening, always learning. Succession planning is part of that journey. It helps us stay nimble, faithful, and ready for what's next.

So let's keep asking:

Our church is busy, really busy! No-one comes to everything, hopefully all who read this magazine will be able to come to something sometimes, and *Treats in the Churchyard* 4-6 on 31st October counts as coming to church, even if you don't come through the door!

In each diocese -we're in Sheffield Diocese with Sheffield, Rotherham and Doncaster- numbers of visitors are counted for one month, and it happens to be October. As the Editor is writing this on 20th October 950 people have come through our doors, that's **an average of 47 each day!** 20 children and 27 adults. We've had some one-off events such as the Bishops coming, and Travis St Lawrence School coming into church for their harvest service, but most months we have one-off events so October is fairly average.

We are getting known for our hospitality. Recently we had wine and birthday cake when Bishop Leah came and we celebrated Lew Rhoades 100th birthday, then both Bishops came and we had cheese and crackers, more wine, and then we had a pie and peas harvest supper, *all in the same week!*

Our thanks go to all those who help in any way. Sennette organises wonderfully and with imagination, thank you Sennette, but she doesn't do all the work, we rely on people to set up, serve and wash up, move tables and chairs, welcome with a smile, make sure we have books or papers if necessary, make sure we have all the necessary in the loo, take teatowels home to wash, it's a big list, please add your own bit here!

I'm helping the church to grow by	THE PERSON NAMED IN	1-11-110
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Oh! I forgot a VERY important job to do... and it's hidden in a way that all the above jobs aren't hidden... it's the basic keeping the church clean! Just five people do this, every two weeks a group of two or a group of three people come into church and spend a couple of hours vacuuming, dusting, polishing. Another person makes sure the brass is polished. They don't do it just when the Bishops come, they each do it every four weeks, for me and for you. Wouldn't it be wonderful if they only had to do it every SIX weeks... Would you be willing to join a third group? It only needs three people, at an average of 20 minutes a week... Please talk to Terry or Chrissy about it if you're willing, they promise you won't be cold, with no stairs to sweep, and no windows to polish!

What's happening to assemblies in schools?

This line of thinking originated when I was listening to a friend who was over-joyed with their Open the Book experience! Rachel sent a photo so you must read her article too, this picture says that assemblies have certainly changed in the last 50+ years!



These wonderful people are taking Bible stories into our schools, are being ASKED to take them, you can see God (you'll never guess who God is here!) in this production of "The Rebellion" proclaiming to Adam and Eve in the beautiful garden! And we know it's not the West End or Broadway, these are not names up in neon, but there are children who *listen and take part* to the extent that they are delighted to see someone from Open the Book outside school see page 25, and they are hearing the same Bible stories that we hear from the front of church. Thank you to all those who are involved!

Current law (1998) requires all state-funded schools in England, Wales and Northern Ireland to hold daily acts of 'Collective Worship'. At present the situation is that "Government guidance in England and guidance in Wales states: 'It is open to a school to have acts of worship that are wholly of a broadly Christian character, acts of worship

that are broadly in the tradition of another religion, and acts of worship which contain elements drawn from a number of different faiths. [The law provides] that within each school term the majority of acts of worship must be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character, but it is not necessary for every act of worship to be so.

In addition, sixth form pupils in England and Wales and parents on behalf of other pupils have the <u>right to withdraw from Collective Worship</u>, either in its entirety or from parts of it. A child can be removed for only the worship element of an assembly and then reintroduced for the remainder of the time.

Finally, the law on the subject of collective worship is not enforced, and not inspected by Ofsted in England."

(This information is from https://assembliesforall.org.uk/ which is a humanist organisation, but had the most succinct, and here neutral, information.)

So the law says there should be a daily act of worship which should have a majority, that could be 51%, Christian element. The law is not enforced or inspected. There is a bill presently going through the House of Lords to repeal this so no act of any sort of worship has to be held.

There is at present a Bill to amend the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 to make provision regarding assemblies at state schools without a designated religious character in England; to repeal the requirement for those schools to hold collective worship; and for connected purposes.

- Education (Assemblies) Bill originated in the House of Lords, Session 2024/26.
- Second reading the general debate on all aspects of the bill took place on 7 February. Last updated: 11 February 2025 at 18:37
- What happens next? Committee stage the line by line examination of the bill - is yet to be scheduled.

Assisted suicide law would make this a country that says 'some lives are not worth living' – Bishop of London

This article was written by Parish Pump, and issued before Bishop Sarah Mullaly was announced as the next Archbishop of Canterbury.

The Bishop of London has warned peers in the House of Lords that legalising assisted suicide in England and Wales will "change society" by endorsing the idea that "some lives are not worth living".

Bishop Sarah Mullally, the former Chief Nursing Officer for England, was concerned about those who could face internal and subtle pressures to end their lives if assisted suicide were introduced – particularly in the absence of adequate palliative or social care, or out of fear of becoming a burden on their families.

"I understand the fear of many that they may be offered free assisted death before they are offered the care and equipment that they may live," she said.

As the Church of England's lead bishop for health and social care, the Bishop of London was speaking as the House of Lords debated the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill in late September.

The Private Member's Bill, brought by the MP Kim Leadbeater, completed its Third Reading in the Commons in June with a reduced majority of just 23 votes amid mounting concerns about its safety.

Bishop Sarah said it is right for peers now to scrutinise the Bill but argued that no amendments could ultimately make it entirely safe from the negative effects such as people being pressured to end their lives.

"I am deeply concerned that so many in this Parliament are not

heeding the voices of professional and representative bodies that are raising the alarm."

She also rejected the central claim that the Bill would offer people choice at the end of their lives.

"A meaningful choice would see the measures in this Bill set alongside equally available, fully funded palliative and social care services," she said. "Without the choice offered this choice is an illusion.".

She spoke about her personal experience, including as a nurse, priest, and bishop, of spending time with people as they died and said the introduction of assisted dying within the health system would fundamentally alter the role of health professionals.

"To change the law is to change society," she added. "If passed, this Bill will signal that we are a society that believes that some lives are not worth living.

"This Bill would become our State-endorsed position, and our NHS would be active in its delivery."

"I believe in a God who's very being is life, and in that gift we can discover meaning, dignity and innate worth, even if we are dying.

Nevertheless, the assisted dying bill has passed its second reading in the House of Lords, moving it another step closer to becoming law. The Bill now goes to a select committee for further scrutiny, with a deadline of reporting back to the House of Lords by 7th November, before it can move to the next stage.

I am really excited to see what God will do and am busy preparing some fun interactive questions to get the students interested when I visit the canteen each lunchtime next week (20th – 24th October). Do ask me how it's gone and pray for those signing up!

This month has been even more exciting for our Youth Group, as we have had our highest numbers ever, with 23 young people attending last Sunday. We have had 12 new members join this September, which has almost doubled our group from last year. We have started back with lots of fun activities such as fruit kebab making, pretzel making, just dance on the big screen and ultimate frisbee in the dark (yes we purchased a flashing light up frisbee just for the occasion!). But most importantly, we have started a new Bible Study series called "We are Different", where we are exploring why and how Christians are different to the world and what impact being a Christian should have on us too. Last week we looked at what happened when people encountered Jesus in the Bible, and many of them went away completely changed. Saul stopped being violent and persecuting Christians and instead got baptised and changed his name to Paul. The woman at the well went and told everyone she knew about Jesus, becoming the first evangelist! Those who were bleeding or blind were healed and their lives completely changed. And the men on the road to Emmaus were so excited that they ran all the way back to where they had came from! Are we just as changed if we've encountered Jesus? Have we turned from our old ways, stopped being violent, been healed or just become so excited that we want to share Jesus with others? I hope so!

This month I also heard news that our amazing Hatfield Heroes will be the Dunscroft Coop Local Community Cause again this year. They loved having us so much a year ago that they chose us, and we're really looking forward to having them join us on litter picks and other activities out in the community. It means that the young people will get some funding too, which we use to subsidise trips and to buy hoodies for them all.

Our amazing new Open the Book team have been keeping me busy this

month too, as we've taken the story of "The Rebellion" and "The Flood" into local primary schools. Pauline, one of our amazing actor volunteers shared this lovely testimony of why we set up the team here in Hatfield, to build positive relationships with our children and community and to increase recognition of Bible stories:

As I was walking my dogs this morning, a child says "hello, you're that lady who comes into school telling Bible stories". I replied, "yes I am! Have you told mummy about them?". He replied "yes I do!" I asked "Do you enjoy it?". He replied "Yes, I do!" with a big smile on his face. I wished him a good day and that I would see him soon.

Finally, I am really excited for the next two Lawrence's Place Community Café sessions. There has been a lot of buzz around the Pokémon card swap table in November, as many of our children and "big children" collect and trade these. I am also hoping that our Hatfield Heroes will be there at December's café to run a "Christmas Gift Wrap Station". So if you have some gifts already purchased and would like for someone else to wrap them, please bring them along. This will be free but donations to our trip fund always appreciated!


