Waiting, Wonder, and Worship

Advent is a season of joyful expectation or waiting with hope! As followers of Jesus we live between two horizons: the first coming of Christ in humility, and the second coming of Christ in glory. That is the tension we hold each December: we celebrate the child in the manger, while longing for the King who will return, robed in dreadful majesty! (As the advent hymn 'Lo he comes') puts it.

Scripture reminds us of this double horizon. "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9.2). That light shone in Bethlehem, and it will shine again when Christ returns. "The grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people" (Titus 2.11), but Paul goes on to say we are "waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ" (Titus 2.13). Advent is about living in that waiting room, not idle, but active in faith, prayer, and mission.

The Christmas message is that there is hope for a ruined humanity, hope of pardon, hope of peace with God & hope of glory. This is because at the Father's will Jesus became poor, and was born in a stable so that thirty years later he might hang on a cross. One of my absolute heroes of the faith, the Anglican

Clergyman The Rev'd John Stott put it even more starkly:

"The essence of sin is man substituting himself for God, while the essence of salvation is God substituting himself for man."

Christmas is not just about shepherds and angels, but about the astonishing truth that God came down, took our place, and opened the way back to Himself.

Our liturgy helps us live this truth. The Church of England gives us rich seasonal prayers: collects that speak of Christ's coming in glory, readings that stretch our vision beyond the manger to the throne. The **Advent wreath** is a teaching tool for us all: each candle marking hope, peace, joy, and love, with the central white candle proclaiming Christ as the light of the world!

The **Blessing of the Crib** during Midnight Mass (at the earlier time of **8pm** – in the hope that more people will feel able to attend) reminds us that this is not just a charming tableau, but a sign of God's astonishing grace, Emmanuel, God with us!

Here in Hatfield, Advent and Christmas are not only about services and carols, but about how we live as a community. We know the pressures of modern life, the tensions of change, and the weariness many feel. Advent invites us to slow down, to pray, and to remember that Christ is our hope.

Lighting the wreath in church reminds us that light grows week by week and perhaps we can be that growing light in our village, through kindness, hospitality, and witness. The crib reminds us that God came close and so we too are called to draw close to neighbours, especially those who are lonely or grieving at Christmas.

So this December, may we wait with expectation, wonder at the incarnation, and worship the Saviour who came once in humility and will come again in glory. And may our parish life here in Hatfield St Lawrence reflect that gospel. A living and growing community renewed in faith, released in ministry, and rejuvenated in mission.



I am sorry I was not alive during that wonderful four-year period when Oliver Cromwell abolished Christmas; no Christmas parties, no carol services, no cards to send and no frantic last-minute shopping. That man was a hero.

Planning for Christmas at St James' normally starts on 2nd January. By Easter, the flowers for church have been carefully chosen to be colour coordinated, and the seating plans and table decorations for the Christmas party have been allocated (with nominated reserves in case someone should inconveniently die in the intervening eight months). Long before Summer is over, the tree lights have been tested, music for the 9 Lessons and Carols Service has been chosen and the service sheets printed. Way before the dark nights set in, car parking attendants will have been found, those who are to light all the candles will have been rehearsed to perfection, and the brass lectern has had its annual polish.

We do not do spontaneity at St James the Least of All. If ever there was a service when time for something unexpected had to be allowed, its place would be announced in the order of service, how long the unexpected thing would happen for would have been decided by a committee, and who was to be spontaneous would have been allocated on a rota.

But the one person none of these well-meaning, efficient, committed organisers can control is the Rector. You could call it a staff perk.


Carols will (accidentally, of course) be announced in the wrong order; if verse 3 was to be omitted, I announce it will be verse 4. This keeps the organist on his toes while the choir hovers on the point of a collective nervous breakdown. At the Christmas supper, my introductory welcome speech and extensive grace make those in the kitchen wonder if the vegetables being boiled should better be served as thick soup.

I offer the helpful suggestion that the tree, having been installed and decorated in the chancel, may perhaps look better in the sanctuary and I turn all the heating off throughout the season, explaining that it will help the flowers to last. All Services will start five minutes early (was my watch rather fast?) so I can look disapprovingly at those still coming in while we are singing the first carol and making it clear that I think they had spent too long in the pub next door.

And so we all reach Christmas morning, with 12 months of planning having gone yet again slightly awry, with parishioners exhausted and I exhilarated at the chaos that has been created with such ease. Mr Cromwell, your spirit lives on.

These are not, of course, St Lawrence mice, but just as good to colour in!

Christmas started far more than 2,000 years ago!

Yes indeed! The Old Testament contains many prophecies about a coming Messiah which were fulfilled by Jesus. Here are just some examples:

He would be born of a virgin.

Isaiah foresaw: 'Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a Son, and will call Him Immanuel.' (Isaiah 7:14)

He would be born in Bethlehem.

Micah wrote: 'But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times.' (Micah 5:2)

His lineage would be of the line of David.

Jeremiah prophesied: 'The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, a King who will reign wisely and do what is just and right in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. This is the name by which he will be called: The Lord Our Righteous Saviour.' (Jeremiah 23:5-6).

He would bring healing

Isaiah looks forward to: 'Then will the eyes of the blind be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped. Then will the lame leap like a deer, and the mute tongue shout for joy.' (Isaiah 35:5–6) And the Psalms add that He will be the one who 'forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases.' (Psalm 103:3)

He would be betrayed

The Psalms prophesy: 'Even my close friend, someone I trusted, one who shared my bread, has turned against me.' (Psalm 41:9) Zechariah even prophesies the price of that betrayal: 'So they paid me thirty pieces of silver.' (Zechariah 11:12)

He would be crucified

Psalm 22 foresees the horror of His crucifixion: 'My God, my God, why

have you forsaken me?... All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads. "He trusts in the Lord," they say, "let the Lord rescue him. Let him deliver him, since he delights in him."... I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint. My heart has turned to wax; it has melted within me. My mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; you lay me in the dust of death...Dogs surround me, a pack of villains encircles me; they pierce my hands and my feet. All my bones are on display; people stare and gloat over me. They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment.

And Isaiah explains this suffering: 'Surely He took up our pain and bore our suffering, yet we considered Him punished by God, stricken by Him, and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on Him, and by His wounds we are healed.' (Isaiah 53: 4-5)

He would rise from the dead

Malachi declares: 'But for you who revere my name, the sun of righteousness will rise with healing in its rays.'

And the Psalms put it this way: 'Therefore my heart is glad ... because you will not abandon me to the realm of the dead, nor will you let your faithful one see decay. ... You will fill me with joy in your presence, with eternal pleasures at your right hand.' (Psalm 16: 8-11)

Finally, in Acts, Peter uses the Old Testament to explain Jesus to the crowd at Pentecost:

"Fellow Israelites, I can tell you confidently that the patriarch David died and was buried, and his tomb is here to this day. But he was a prophet and knew that God had promised him on oath that he would place one of his descendants on his throne.

"Seeing what was to come, he spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, that He was not abandoned to the realm of the dead, nor did His body see decay. God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of it. Exalted to the right hand of God, He has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear.... Therefore, let all Israel be assured of this: God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Messiah." (Acts 2: 29 - 36)

As Christmas draws near, life often seems to speed up, lists to complete, preparations to make, and little time to pause. Yet Advent is a season that calls us to do the very opposite: to wait. Not with frustration or impatience, but with **hopeful expectation**, trusting in God's promises even when they are unseen.

Our Advent Quiet Afternoon, on the theme "Waiting in Hope," offers a gentle space to step aside from the busyness of daily life and enter into stillness. It's an opportunity to rest in God's presence, to listen for His voice, and to prepare our hearts to welcome Christ afresh this Christmas.

There will be moments of silence, short reflections, and a number of simple prayer stations to explore at your own pace. Each station invites you to pause, pray, and reflect on what it means to wait with faith and hope.

As you arrive, you'll be given a small **prayer journal** to use throughout the afternoon, somewhere to write or draw your own prayers and thoughts as you journey through the space.

Before they even get their wings!


Then they practice flying well For crashing just might break the spell The shepherds won't be 'sore afraid' If laughter drowns the carols played!


