

We hold 'national treasures for the common good' - new repairs fund announced

The Church of England's Director for Cathedral and Church buildings, Emily Gee, has welcomed the Government's Places of Worship Renewal Fund, and its willingness to invest in repairs and improvements for eligible parish and cathedral church buildings.

She said: "We also welcome the Government's recognition of the special role of historic churches in national life - church buildings are national treasures for the common good.

“They have huge spiritual, cultural and historical significance, and are major centres of practical assistance through food banks, lunch clubs and parent and toddler groups. They serve as a place of sanctuary, refreshment and cultural heritage throughout the UK.

"The vast majority of fundraising for the maintenance and repair of these buildings is done locally by *heroic volunteers*"

and Government support is crucial in helping them reach their targets - and we are really grateful for this ongoing support.

"However, we are very concerned that the end of the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme - after more than 20 years - will mean added pressure on local fundraisers and inevitably a drain on other sources of funding. We will work with the wider sector and the Government to see how that burden can be alleviated."

Faith in the North:

Why Hatfield's Story Matters More Than Ever!

If you've been around St Lawrence for any length of time, you'll know that our church is full of stories. Some are recent: baptisms, weddings, friendships formed over cups of tea. Others stretch back centuries, woven into the stones, the fields, and even the air around Hatfield. But every now and then, a moment comes when the old stories and the new ones meet, and something stirs. I think we're in one of those moments now.

Across the Northern Province the Archbishop of York has launched an initiative called **Faith in the North**. At its heart, it's a simple but powerful idea: the Christian story of the North of England is deep, ancient, and full of life and it still has something to say today. The hope is that churches will rediscover the stories under their feet and let them shape mission, prayer, and renewal. And here's the exciting bit: Hatfield has a unique part to play in this!

A Story Written Into Our Landscape

According to the Venerable Bede, one of the great early historians of the Church, **King Edwin of Northumbria** one of the most significant early Christian kings **died here at Hatfield Chase** in 633 AD. His death was a turning point in the Christian story of the North. It's not just a footnote in a dusty book; it happened on the very ground we walk on. Inside St Lawrence, that story is already quietly present. We have a striking icon of **Edwin, Hild, and Our Lady**, and a beautiful stained glass window of **Paulinus and Edwin**. These aren't just decorations, they're reminders that our parish sits in the middle of a story far bigger than ourselves.





Becoming a Pilgrim Place

We're beginning to take steps for **St Lawrence to become a Pilgrim Place**.

What does that mean? It is simply recognising what God has already given us. A place where people can encounter faith through history, prayer, and welcome. A Pilgrim Place is a church that says: *"Come and see. Come and walk. Come and pray. Come and discover the story of God in this landscape."* It's mission rooted in place. It's evangelism that begins with hospitality. It's renewal that grows from remembering who we are.

The year 2027 marks 1400 years since Edwin's baptism by Paulinus (the first Bishop of York) a huge milestone in the Christian story of the North. I'm already in conversations about the possibility of hosting a major event here at St Lawrence to mark the anniversary. It could be a moment of real significance, not just for us, but for the wider region.

Why This Matters for Us

- It gives us a way to tell our story with confidence.
- It opens our doors to people who might never come on a Sunday morning.
- It helps us root our faith in something deep, local, and real.

It invites us to pray for renewal in Hatfield.

We're not trying to become something new. We're rediscovering what we already are.

A Parish With a Past and a Future. My hope is that as we step into this, we'll find ourselves encouraged, energised, and maybe even surprised by what God is doing among us.

Hatfield has always been a place of story, of encounter, of faith lived out in ordinary lives.

Becoming a Pilgrim Place simply helps us name that and share it. So let's pray, imagine, and walk this path together. The story of faith in the North runs right through Hatfield. And our chapter is still being written.



Diary of a Youth Worker

Yes I have officially changed to just be “Youth” worker, and so my monthly slot will be more youth focussed! This was for two reasons:

Our numbers at our youth group have grown quickly in the last few years meaning there are now 20-30 young people every fortnight at Hatfield Heroes. They need more support and time investing in them, and I wasn't able to focus on them before. I have also been given an open door into Ash Hill Academy, which is very rare, and I wanted to take that opportunity to share Jesus with all the teenagers from our Parish.

We now have an amazing clergy and volunteer team who are stepping up to take on some of the things I was responsible for, such as Little Lions and Primary School work. This is a great testament to the strength of the ministry here in Hatfield, and a growing team of people willing to play their part. Maybe there is something you'd like to do or help out with – please do just ask!

So on that note, I'd like to let you know of two exciting things that have happened at Ash Hill Academy this month. One is that our Youth Alpha Course has officially converted into being a Christian Union and is going to continue every term for the foreseeable future. We have gathered some new Christians and some who go to churches across the city, with around 6 attending each time. Unfortunately the school show rehearsals are on the same night, so quite a few who would like to come can't at the moment, but I am hopeful they might do later on. We have seen one of the attendees come along to Café Church which was wonderful! Please pray for all these young people who have been gifted bibles thanks to your generous donations, and we have a great time praying together, playing games, and will be doing the 40acts generosity challenge for lent around school. This will



include a prayer walk around classrooms, leaving gifts for teachers, and handing out chocolate in the canteen!

Secondly, to help promote the CU and just generally be a positive presence in school, I have started hosting “Pop-Up Prayer Spaces” in the canteen every Thursday lunchtime for an hour and a half. This means I see every student in the school, and provide opportunities for faith-related discussion, prayer and creativity. So far we have prayed about our hopes and dreams for

2026, pledged to give up or take up new things for lent, and shared the names of those we love on a Valentine’s Prayer Wall! I have lots of creative Easter related prayer space ideas for the next half term, and each week I give away Mark’s gospels and prayer cards to those interested and willing to chat.

Who knows where God will take this ministry and how many we will reach in Ash Hill, but I ask that you continue to pray for me and the young people there over the coming weeks.


Bible Bite

what they could do.




He gave 5 bags of coins to the

Bishop backs action to curb 'truly appalling' AI deepfakes

The availability of technology creating sexualised deepfakes of real people is “truly appalling” from a Christian perspective, the Bishop of Oxford, Steven Croft, has said.

Bishop Steven, who leads for the Church of England on AI and technology, was speaking after warnings that criminals appear to have been using the Grok tool, which is linked to X, to create sexualised images of children.

Grok announced recently it was restricting the use of image generation and editing to most users, although they are still available to paying subscribers.

Bishop Steven, co-chair of the Anglican Communion Science Commission, said: “From a perspective of Christian faith, all the major world faiths, and civil society, the unleashing of this capacity in Grok by X is truly appalling.

“The sexualised deepfakes of real individuals used without their consent is immensely damaging to the individuals' dignity and the dignity of our society.

He supported the Government's drive to ban nudification apps through an amendment to the Crime and Policing Bill. And he urged the Government “to apply the same robust stance across the entire technology sector and to develop a new framework for responsible AI deployment which identifies benefits but also highlights dangers.”

15th March – Mothers and children

Whatever our childhood was like, it was formational. We learned from our earthly parents, good things ideally, although not everyone's childhood is great.

In the Bible, St Paul refers to the importance of up-bringing and of spiritual heritage. When he greets Timothy in his second letter to him, he calls him his 'Dear Son', praises his 'genuine faith' and then goes on:

"You share the faith that first filled your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice. And I know that same faith continues strong in you."

Timothy's childhood had been rooted in the Old Testament scriptures that he had been taught by his mother and grandmother. Their example had set him on the right path, until he was old enough to choose for himself to follow Jesus.

Physically, we when we are young, we need nurturing by mothers and fathers. Spiritually it is the same. When we come to faith, we need spiritual mothers and father to help us grow into maturity as God's adopted children.

We also need spiritual sustenance: regularly reading the Bible, spending time in God's presence in prayer, and worshipping with the family of the Church.

God – our heavenly parent - provides our personal nurturing through prayer and the Bible, but He also gives us each other, to encourage and share our experiences of his faithfulness.

However imperfect our earthly upbringing was, *God is a good, good Father, a perfect parent who will only teach us good things.* And gradually, as the fruit of the Holy Spirit ripens in us, we will become more like Jesus. We will gain more of the family likeness!

Is there someone in your life who has helped you to grow spiritually? This Mothering Sunday, thank God for them.

Is there someone your life whom you have 'mothered' or 'fathered' along the way? This Mothering Sunday, pray for them.

MRS HARDING'S GUIDE TO CHURCH ETIQUETTE

1. Arrive early.

Not “bursting through the west door during the second hymn” early. Early enough to sit down, compose yourself, and locate the correct page in the order of service without visible panic.

2. The bells are not feedback.

If they ring for twenty minutes before the service, this is not a complaint about your punctuality. It is a courtesy reminder that time, like salvation, waits for no one.

3. If you ask, “Is this my seat?” it probably isn’t.

But if you’ve sat there for thirty-seven consecutive years, you may defend it gently, with dignity, and a well-placed hymn book.

4. Pray first. Always pray first.

Before chatting. Before adjusting flowers. Before enquiring why the curate has chosen that stole.

5. Coffee exists.

It is not a sacrament. You may survive ten minutes without it.

6. The kneeler is not a footrest.

Nor is it a percussion instrument during the sermon.

7. Candles are devotional.

They are not birthday accessories, mood lighting, or something to “have a little blow at”. Wax on church linen is to be avoided at all times. It’s REALLY annoying.

8. The organ voluntary is not background music.


