GROWTH GROUPS

As we enter the Season of Creation, our Growth Groups at St Lawrence will be exploring the theme of "Living Water", inspired particularly by the beautiful vision in Ezekiel 47.

In Ezekiel's vision, the prophet is taken to the Temple and shown water flowing from beneath its threshold. At first it is only a small stream, but as Ezekiel follows it, the water becomes deeper and deeper until it is a mighty river. Wherever the river flows, it brings life. Trees grow along its banks, fish flourish, and even the waters of the Dead Sea are transformed.

It is a powerful picture of God's life-giving presence.

Over 12 sessions, our Growth Groups will journey alongside this river, asking what this vision might say to us as Christians today.

We will begin by looking at God the Creator and our calling to care for the wonderful world that God has entrusted to us. We will then consider the Temple as the source of the water and reflect upon the

importance of God's presence in our own lives.

As the sessions progress, the water becomes deeper. This gives us an opportunity to think about our own journey of faith. Sometimes our relationship with God may feel like a small trickle; at other times we may experience God's presence much more deeply. Growth in faith is a journey, and we are invited continually to go deeper.

We will also turn to the words of Jesus about living water. In John's Gospel, Jesus tells the Samaritan woman that he can give her "living water", and later declares that those who come to him will have rivers of living water flowing from within them. John explains that Jesus is speaking about the Holy Spirit.

This helps us to see Ezekiel's vision not simply as a passage about the natural world, but as a wonderful picture of God's work in Christ. The living water ultimately points us towards the life which God gives through Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

One of the most striking parts of Ezekiel's vision is what

happens where the river flows. Places that were barren and lifeless become places of abundance. Trees grow beside the river and continually produce fruit, while their leaves are described as being for healing.

That raises an important question for us as a Church: What happens where the life of Christ flows through us?

Our churches are called to be places where people encounter God's love, find welcome, receive nourishment and discover healing. We are not called simply to keep God's living water within our own walls. Like the river in Ezekiel's vision, God's life is meant to flow outward.

This is particularly important as we think about our own community here at St Lawrence. Through worship, prayer, fellowship, Lawrence's Place, our outreach and the many acts of kindness offered by members of our church family, we seek to allow God's love to flow into the wider community.

Towards the end of the course, we will look at Romans 8, where

St Paul speaks of creation itself “groaning” and waiting for God's redemption. We will then arrive at the final chapter of the Bible, Revelation 22, where once again we encounter a river—the river of the water of life flowing from the throne of God.

The Bible therefore begins with creation and ends with creation renewed.

The journey of the Growth Groups is therefore not simply about learning more about the Bible. It is an invitation to ask how we might be changed by God's living water.

Where do we need God's life and refreshment?

Where might God be calling us to go deeper?

And where is God asking us to allow his living water to flow through us so that others may experience his love, healing and hope?

I hope that these twelve sessions will be a time of prayer, conversation, friendship and spiritual growth. Most of all, I pray that as we journey

together, we may discover afresh the words of Ezekiel:

“Where the river flows, everything will live.”

Ezekiel 47:9

May the living water of Christ flow deeply into our own lives, and from us into the life of our church and our community.

THE MEANING BEHIND PRIEST'S VESTMENTS

When we come to church for Holy Communion, we may notice that the priest is wearing a number of different garments. To some, they may simply look beautiful or traditional, but each vestment has a history and, more importantly, points us towards something about the mystery of what we are celebrating.

Vestments are not a costume, nor are they worn to make the priest look important. Rather, they remind us that the priest is serving Christ and the Church, and that in the Eucharist we are taking part in something far greater than ourselves.

The Cassock

Underneath the Eucharistic vestments, the priest will normally wear a cassock. This is the long black garment traditionally worn by clergy.

The black reminds us of our mortality and our need for God. It also represents the setting aside of ordinary clothing as the priest comes to serve God.

The cassock is therefore a reminder that the priest is a servant of Christ.

The Surplice or Alb

Over the cassock, the priest may wear a surplice, or, particularly when celebrating Holy Communion, an alb.

The alb is a long white garment. The word comes from the Latin *albus*, meaning "white". White has long been associated with baptism, purity and the new life we have in Christ.

Before putting on the alb, the priest traditionally prays that God will cleanse their heart and enable them to serve faithfully. The alb therefore reminds us of our baptism and of the new life we have received through Christ.

The Stole

The stole is the long, narrow band of cloth worn around the neck and hanging down in front of the priest.

It is a distinctive sign of ordained ministry. The stole represents the yoke of Christ and reminds the priest that their ministry is one of service.

When the priest puts on the stole, they are reminded that they carry the responsibility of serving God's people and proclaiming the Gospel.

The Chasuble

The most recognisable vestment worn by the priest for Holy Communion is often the chasuble. It is the outer garment worn over the alb and stole.

The chasuble developed from the ordinary travelling cloak of the early Church. Over time, it became a distinctive Eucharistic vestment.

Its shape traditionally reminds us that the priest is covered by the grace of Christ. The priest does not celebrate the Eucharist in their own name; they stand at the altar as a servant of Christ and in the service of the Church.

The colour of the chasuble also changes according to the season or feast of the Church's year.

The Colours of the Church's Year

The different colours help us to understand the season we are celebrating.

White or gold is used for the great feasts of Christ, including Christmas and Easter, and for celebrations associated with joy, resurrection and glory.

Red is used for Pentecost, feasts of the Holy Spirit and the celebration of martyrs. It reminds us of fire, the Holy Spirit and the blood of those who gave their lives for Christ.

Purple is associated particularly with Advent and Lent. It is a colour of penitence, preparation and expectation.

Green is used during much of Ordinary Time. It represents growth and reminds us that the Christian life is a journey in which we are continually growing in faith.

Black may also be used on occasions such as funerals or All Souls, reminding us of mourning, death and our need for the hope of Christ's resurrection.

Why Does the Priest Wear Them?

It is important to remember that the vestments do not make someone a priest. Nor do they make the Eucharist holy. It is Christ who is the true High Priest, and it is Christ who is at the heart of the sacrament.

The vestments help us to see with our eyes what is happening spiritually.

When we see the priest vested for Holy Communion, we are reminded that this is not simply another service or another meeting. We are gathered around the altar to give thanks to God, to hear God's Word, to offer ourselves to God and to receive Christ in the sacrament.

The vestments also remind the priest of the sacred responsibility entrusted to them.

Perhaps the simplest way of putting it is this:

The vestments take the focus away from the priest as an individual and point us towards Christ.

So, the next time you see the priest preparing for Holy Communion, take a moment to look at the vestments. The alb, stole and chasuble are not merely beautiful pieces of church clothing. Each carries a story and a reminder of the Gospel.

As we gather at the altar, the vestments point us beyond the priest, beyond the building and beyond ourselves—to Jesus Christ, our great High Priest, who gives himself to us and calls us to give ourselves to him.

A BOOK REVIEW

***A Fatal Crossing* by Tom Hindle**

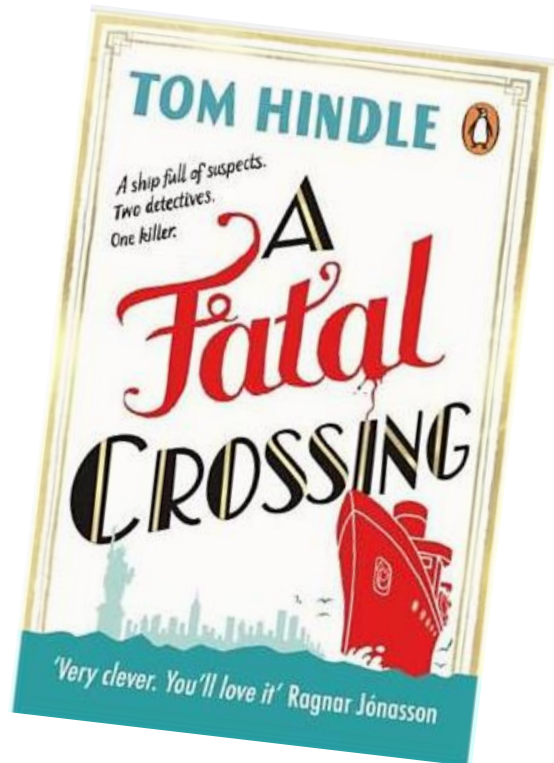
Tom Hindle's *A Fatal Crossing* is a clever, well-written and ingenious thriller that combines the classic murder mystery with the pace of a modern page-turner. Set aboard a 1920s cruise liner crossing the Atlantic, it creates the perfect setting for murder: a glamorous ship, a limited number of suspects and nowhere for the killer to escape.

What makes the novel particularly enjoyable is Hindle's clever plotting. The clues and revelations keep the reader guessing, while the twists continually challenge your assumptions about what has really happened. The story moves at an excellent pace without sacrificing atmosphere or character.

Hindle's writing is another strength. The period setting is vividly brought to life, and the ship itself creates an increasingly claustrophobic sense of danger beneath its glamorous exterior. The novel has the feel of a classic whodunit while remaining fresh and engaging.

Overall, *A Fatal Crossing* is a thoroughly entertaining thriller: atmospheric, inventive and difficult to put down. For fans of classic mysteries and modern thrillers alike, it is a highly enjoyable read.

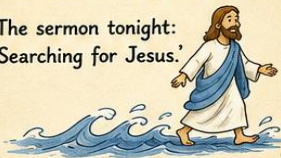

This being Easter Sunday, we will ask Mrs Lewis to come forward and lay an egg on the altar.

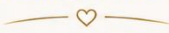
